At least seven died on boat capsized

Slim chance to find missing alive

At least seven persons drowned and 26 others went missing in Banke when a boat on the Rapti river capsized Wednesday at Govarpur Ghat in Kanchanpur VDC-1. The boat passengers from Baijapur were going towards Govarpur village in the VDC to watch a Lakhe dance programme. The survivors said boat overloading and flooding in the river resulted in the accident. The boat had a maximum capacity of a dozen persons.

"There is slim chance of finding the missing alive," said Damodar Rokaya, who helped rescue some of the survivors and took them to Bheri Zonal Hospital. "The boat was overloaded," said Karmi Thapa, 15, of Baijapur, one of those rescued. "It was tilting. It suddenly overturned due to the strong current." She also said that her elder sister Mina and Nisha Chaudhary and Samjhana Chaudhary are among the missing.

Deputy superintendent of police Uttam Karki said the bodies of seven passengers were retrieved, while a search is on for the missing persons. He added that there were more than 40 persons piled on the boat. The rest of the passengers managed to swim to safety, he said. Most of the missing were women and children. Tika Giri and her son were identified among those dead.

Ten persons from the family of Jaluram Tharu of Belaspur of Baijapur VDC, two from the family of Prem Giri of the same VDC, two from the family of Khem Bahadur Basnet of Kanchanpur VDC, six persons from the family of Bhagiram Tharu, of Nawalpur village in Baijapur VDC-1 and two persons from the family of Dandbir Nepali of Baisa village of the same VDC are missing. Laxmi Pariyar from Lalpur of Baijapur-9 and Karmi Thapa were rescued by locals. Laxmi said the boat sank in the middle of the river when water flooded it.

Police teams are engaged in searching for the missing persons. The mishap site lies three kilometres from Agaiya of Banke district.

In similar incident before, five students of Saraswati Lower Secondary School of Rukum district drowned to death after a boat they were rowing in Syarpu Lake at Bafikot capsized on 26th August. The boat capsized from same reason as fresh Banke mishap, it was overloaded beyond capacity.

Flood wreak havoc in Rautahat

Bridge swept away, transportation halted

In Rautahat, inundation triggered by ceaseless rainfall swept away Dhunsar bridge located in the area bordering Rautahat and Bara districts, Wednesday. Transportation along the area is completely halted after the flood dislodged the bridge. The flood also eroded over 100 meters of riverbank where the woods of the dismantled bridge had piled.

Passengers bound for various destinations including Kathmandu are stranded. Telecommunications in and around Chandraniga-hpur VDC is out of service as the flood also swept away the optical fiber lines. The flood has also swamped over 12 villages of the district. Floods demolished 10 houses in Karkach Karmach and 9 houses in Maryadapur VDCs on Wednesday.

Similarly in Rasuwa, landslide looms over villages of Haku VDC-9 following heavy rain in the past few days. The landslides have disrupted drinking water supply in ward number 4, 8 and 9 of the VDC, while landslide at Koktan area has put nearly 300 households at risk. Similarly, landslide swept away a sports hall, three watermills and a wooden bridge at Dada Gaun VDC-7.

Two thousand flood victims starved

Residents of Holiya VDCs, who were displaced due to flooding in the Rapti river, are now facing starvation and diseases. Two thousand people of at least 320 households located at Chhitaipurawa, Simarahana, Tepari and Ghodiyapur villages of ward Nos 4, 5 and 6 at Holiya VDC were displaced after floodwater gushed into their households. They are taking shelter in local schools, relatives' houses and in India.

Earlier, floods swept away foostuffs they had stored in their households. They have also run out of beaten rice provided by the Nepal Red Cross. Omkar Yadav of Chhitaipurawa, who is taking shelter with nine family members at a local school, said, "We now have nothing left for eating. Perhaps, we will die of starvation." He urged the government to arrange food for them soon. Bijaya Prasad Gaudiya of Holiya-5 Simarahana said, "Food is our urgent demand; shelter comes next." "We have nowhere to turn to when our children demand food."

Diseases, including diarrhoea, pneumonia, flue and fever, are gripping flood victims. Ram Bahadur Bahun of Holiya-5 Chhitaipurawa said lack of proper food and shelter have rendered them ill. In the first phase, local administration and Red Cross have distributed tents and beaten rice for 208 households, said head of the Red Cross in Nepalgunj Ishwor Regmi. He also said that second phase of distribution of relief materials will begin soon. *(The Himalayan Times)*

Nepal sound serious as the victims are deprived of basic requirements and delay in rescue operations. For instance, five hundred displaced flood victims of Kailali district are downcast with governmental and non governmental agencies as they are being deprived of water (Disaster Watch- 30th August report). Emergency relief materials are inadequate comparing with multitude of disaster victims in several districts, as media reports. The UN World Health Organization (WHO) has also stressed on increasing risk of diarrhoeal and vector borne diseases after flood situation.

The discrepancy between flood and landslides victims in terms of response and recovery can be easily noticed. Apparently, landslides areas are geographical far and remote. Moreover, the institutional strength of related organizations such as NRCS in those districts are not well enough to furnish adequate support. Thus, the landslides victims are being overlooked there. The scourge of disaster is not less for them, instead its tougher due to the irrecoverable property demolition. The magnitude of the affected population from landslide may not be as that of flood but victimized are utterly ravaged.

Nepal is on the eve of festive season. Teej, festival of Nepalese women has already knocked the door, which will be followed by Dashain and Tihar. On one hand, disaster victims are starving for two square meal but on other hand rest are making merry on festivals. Disaster victims will be not in festive mood this year, but at least they should be ensured on having basic requirements: appropriate food, safe drinking water and shelter before they will be transferred into resilience mode.

Landslides kill five in Kalikot, Palpa

Three members of a family died after they were buried under a landslide's debris at Rakhu VDC in Kalikot district on Tuesday morning. A 42-year-old man Jayaram Budha and his sons 18-year-old Manasara and 12-year-old Tapendra died in the landslide triggered by rainfall. Ten houses are likely to collapse due to the landslide. The cattle belonging to the family was also buried under the landslide.

Some 25 Nepal Army personnel from neighboring Kotwada base camp have spread in the area to search for the missing people. The village is located some four hours away from district headquarters Manma.

Meanwhile, two teenage girls died and two others were injured in a landslide at Juthapauwa-3 Chahala on Tuesday afternoon. Bishnu Khadka, 11, and five-month-old Tirsana Kunwar of Baldenggadhi-4 died in the landslide. Asmita Kunwar of Baldenggadhi-4 and another were injured.

Worst disaster hit after decades in Rupendehi

Rupendehi district has witnessed worst disaster hit after decades as locals said. Rupendehi is western terai district and commercial, educational hub of the region. Atleast 500 households in ward numbers 8, 11 and 13 of the Butwal municipality were displaced due to the flooding in Tinau river occurred since Sunday night.. Incessant rainfall has disrupted life at Sundarnagar, Pabitrnagar, Durganagar, Pragatinagar, Ekatanagar, Hattisud, Budhhanagar and Majhauwa areas of Butwal. The flooding is assumed to be the worst disaster to hit the area after devastating flood of 1981.

Rekha MC, chairperson of the Settlement Development Committee at Hattisud said she had witnessed a similar scale flooding in 1981 when the whole of Daure Tole, now a bus park, was swept away.

River water flooded into the settlements because of weak embankment. The flood has also destroyed the embankment built by the people. Secretary at ward number 8 of Butwal Municipality, Urmila Shrestha said that the almost half of 600 squatters sheds at Sundarnagar of Khayardhari area at ward no. 8 have been flooded away.

Locals of several settlements around Tinau riverbanks who were displaced by flooding in the river have started facing acute shortage of food and shelter. Although Red Cross Society and Chamber of Commerce and Industries provided foodstuffs and other relief materials on Monday, the victims continue to starve in these areas.

Following the inundation on Monday, many homeless locals are taking shelter at nearby bus stops, temples, sports hall and the building of Chamber of Commerce and Industries. Others have been forced to stay under the open sky.

Administrative officer at the Butwal Municipality, Krishna Prasad Gyawali said a committee was formed on Tuesday, under the coordination of the municipality, comprising representatives of Butwal chamber of commerce and industries, NGO Federation and Nepal Red Cross Society, to assess the damage and to distribute relief materials.

Mass exodus fearing landslide

A landslide triggered by three days of heavy rainfall has blocked the Kusma-Baglung section of Pokhara. (1st Sep)

The cases of encephalitis and meningitis viral fever are rapid in Nepalgunj aftermath of flood and inundation. Till now four persons were died of encephalitis and more than 30 were affected. (30th Aug)

As a consequence of flood triggered circumstances, at least 60 persons are affected from viral influenza in Narayan Khola VDC-3 of Sarlahi district. (30th Aug)

Seven thousand residents of Kusma, district headquarter of Parwat, are suffering from water scarcity as the pipe line of main supply center was swept away by the landslide. (25th Aug)

In Kaski, over 30 houses in different villages were damaged of incessant rainfall. Villagers of 15 households in Hemja VDC had vacated their homes on Monday. Thirty-three other households are at risk.

Similarly, family members of 17 households were shifted to safer places Tuesday morning, as a crack appeared in the land following a landslide at Paharepani and Mandhredhunga of Kaskikot VDC-8 in Kaski earlier night. According to technical assistant at Kaskikot VDC Indra Bahadur GC, they were shifted with the help of locals, police and leaders of various political parties.

The torrential rain Tuesday further affected Lekhnath and Dhumpush VDCs. Rainfall has displaced over 100 locals of the villages so far. According to locals, more houses in the villages were on the brink of being swept away.

Similarly, in Khotang, landslides triggered by continuous rainfall have displaced locals of nearly 10 homes in Hauchaur VDC-4 and 5, Tuesday. The displaced are taking refuge at their neighbors' homes.

Cholera epidemic : just rumour

The Epidemiology and Diseases Control Division (EDCD), Department of Health Services, has said no case of severe outbreak of cholera was verified throughout the country last month. It has further stressed on under control situation of cholera in the country.

Dr Bindeshwar Prasad Yadav, focal point for diseases and out break control at EDCD, said that no severe cholera epidemic has spreaded and the information regarding outbreak of cholera, also called gastroenteritis (GE), were verified as mere rumours.

"Except for the case of Rautahat in June and the several outbreaks of gastroenteritis in the valley in June and July, no critical situation has been recorded so far," Yadhav said, adding that minor cases are reported now and then, but they are not outbreaks.

Yadhav, who recently returned to the capital after visiting flood-hit villagers in the Tarai districts, said that the disease was under control even though they feared gastroenteritis outbreaks due to the floods.

170 houses swept away, 1000 displaced in Rupandehi

Floodwaters from the Tinau river swept away over 100 houses built on the banks of the river at Khayardhari, Majhuwa, Pragatinagar and Devinagar in Butwal Municipality. The swollen river burst banks and swept away around 104 houses on Monday morning. Over 1,000 households have become displaced and 500 houses are completely waterlogged. The flooding even damaged over 12 concrete-built houses.

According to the locals, they were forced to vacate their homes at midnight Sunday after floodwater from the Tinau suddenly meandered into their areas. Although the flood has not claimed any human casualties so far, most of the families lost their belongings and foodstuffs. They somehow managed to evacuate their homes and hasten out of the area. The displaced were forced to remain drenched throughout the night as no rescue teams reached them. Many

Risk of post-flood diseases increasing : WHO

The UN World Health Organization (WHO) in Nepal in a new report has said it is concerned about the increasing risk of diarrhoeal and vector-borne diseases in the country due to recent floods and landslides.

According to the WHO report on 3 September entitled Emergency Health Action in Nepal, there is no major disease epidemic as yet, but government officials said there was cause for concern, as the risk of disease is associated more with post-flood situations like displacement, availability of safe water and sanitation facilities. Disease outbreaks are also affected by overcrowding, the underlying health status of individuals and the availability of health care services. WHO warned that contaminated water meant there was a heightened risk of the spread of diarrhoeal-related diseases, including dysentery, cholera, typhoid and gastroenteritis. There was also a high risk of vector-borne diseases like malaria and Japanese Encephalitis (JE) due to waterlogged areas, which have posed a major challenge and even hindered access to the worst affected areas, the report said.

Outbreaks of communicable diseases are common every monsoon in Nepal, but this year's diarrhoea and cholera were worse in Rautahat (110km southeast of Kathmandu) and Kalikot (700km northwest of Kathmandu), said WHO. Government health officials said they regretted they were unable to prevent 39 deaths for lack of staff and medicines at village health centres.

"This incident sadly illustrates the importance of a functional peripheral health system, community-based surveillance, early warning, prompt control measures and health education," said the report.

WHO said this year's flooding was much worse than in the last two years. "It is too early to write off the risk. The monsoon season is not over and endemic diseases continue to claim a heavy toll in remote districts," the report said, adding that there had been increased cases of viral fever, acute respiratory infections, eye and ear infections and skin ailments.

Insecurity

"The political situation is worsening and there are often strikes and a very insecure environment," said Ram Hari Shah, a local health worker in Mahottari, 130km south of the capital. There have been violent protests in the Terai region of southern Nepal, according to local non-governmental organisations (NGOs). Health workers are afraid to visit some villages as they fear they might be

CRWRC to feed 50,000 flood victims

Fifty thousand lives capsized by floods in India will eat two square meals a day after a \$275,000 proposal for food aid penned by the Christian Reformed World Relief Committee (www.crwrc.org) was given the green light on Friday, August 31, 2007.

"Sometimes the scale of a disaster can be overwhelming," says Ken Little, CRWRC senior relief project manager. "I am very encouraged that we can provide this important emergency food package to these families."

Indians in the Bihar districts of Sitamrhi, Supaul and Samastipur - 80% of whom are Dalit poor - will receive staples such as rice, wheat, beans, salt and oil as early as September 10.

It is intended that the food aid will also provide a sense of food security so impoverished families can avoid borrowing money or selling possessions just to stay fed.

CRWRC's food aid for India

The victims also said that all their clothes, utensils and foodstuff were also swept away by the landslide. "Locals have been providing us food and some of the victims are living in cowsheds," said Bhandari.

Meanwhile, one house was demolished while 15 others were affected in Singdi village of Pasgaun VDC of Lamjung district due to a recent landslide. Locals there have asked authorities to provide immediate help as a whole settlement in the area has been affected by the landslide.

Magnanimous contribution from ICIMOD

ICIMOD staff of Nepal and Centre raised Rs 567,352 (approx. US\$ 8,800) as contributions for providing relief to the communities affected by floods in Nepal this year. The contribution was handed over to the Nepal Red Cross with a request to direct these funds towards the four most affected districts of Mahottari, Sarlahi, Dhanusa, and Rautahat, where ICIMOD had earlier conducted case studies on disaster preparedness.

ICIMOD also turned over 20 copies of ICIMOD's publication, *The Snake and the River Don't Run Straight*, translated in Nepali and 50 copies to DP-Net, Nepal for dissemination to organisations working at community level. The publication is a case study on local knowledge for disaster preparedness, with particular reference to flood disasters. Banke villages relapsed into travail

Four villages in Holiya VDC of Banke district have been flooded again, leaving 2500 hundred of 322 families displaced. Water entered 2 km into human habitation after the Rapti river overflowed. Chitapurwa, Simrahawa, Tepri and Ghodenpurwa villages were transformed into a lake. The swollen river swept away locals' houses.

The displaced families were sheltering in the Khadaicha primary school and cowsheds. The flood water began entering the villages two days ago and possibility of draining the water or diverting it back into the river has minimised. Nepal Army teams were engaged in relief and rescue work.

The floodwaters made its way into the village by eroding the infrastructure built by Water Induced Disaster Prevention office in Rapti river at a cost of nearly Rs 10 million. According to locals, the floodwaters was only 50 meters away from their village when they vacated their homes. The locals hit by flood almost every year have been demanding that government provide them alternative place of residence.

Nearly 500 of the displaced locals have migrated to Gulariya, Gangapur, Laxmanpur, Holiya and Majgaiyan villages in India after relatives from across the border came to rescue them. Meanwhile, the flood-hit victims are also suffering starvation. Although the Red Cross Society distributed foodstuff to the victims on Friday, the stock was inadequate for the multitude of victims.

Army, armed police and civil teams managed to save some belongings of the affected people. Teams of the District Administration Office, Red Cross, natural disaster cell, community forest users committee will begin rehabilitating the displaced people from Sunday.

Food aid for some of the 2.5 million flood victims in Pakistan is also part of CRWRC's ongoing flood relief efforts. A list of 10,000 beneficiaries is expected to be completed by September 15, after which a food-for-work project through local partner Interfaith League Against Poverty (ILAP) will begin in the Southwest area of the Balochistan province.

"Whole sections of villages are gone," writes CRWRC International Relief Manager Fred Knip in an email from Pakistan. "People are starting to move back to where they used to live, taking their tents with (them)."

The record 2007 monsoon season impacted more than 35 million people in India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Myanmar, Cambodia, Thailand, Indonesia, Vietnam, China and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea. Those most affected have been the poor.

CRWRC is currently active in 30 countries, and has an international reputation for "helping people help themselves."

Medicine distributed in Banke, Bardia

A joint medical team of Nepalese Army including its doctors has distributed medicine after carrying out health examination of 5811 people suffering from various diseases triggered by flood in Banke and Bardia district.

The team examined the health of 3,067 people in Holia, Ganeshpur, Babagau, Betahni and Sonapur area of Banke district and 2,744 people in Neulapur, Bhurigau, Shivpur, Baghi, Suryapatuwa and Mahamadpur area of Bardia district, said the Public Relations Directorate of the Army.

2 girls swept away by river

He also said that they could not trace the missing girls even after a frantic search and there were slim chances of rescuing them alive.

Due to heavy rain on Thursday night, most of the rivulets have been flooded while vehicular movement to and from the district was also disrupted on Friday.
