Two killed, five injured in landslides in Gulmi

Two children were killed and five others were injured on Friday morning when landslides hit their home at Biswakharka in Gulmi district.

The landslide caused by incessant rainfall over last few days hit Rudra Basyal's home killing his sons Raju and Santosh. The injured are being treated at a local health care. The incident occurred around 3:30 A.M. Including this, the death toll rise to 19 in Gulmi.

Meanwhile in Bhrikutinagar of Nepalgunj, one Tul Bahadur BK was killed when a shed he was living in collapsed.

Diarrhea, encephalitis, typhoid grip on

At least four people including three children have died due to Japanese encephalitis that has spread in epidemic proportion in Banke district in mid-western Nepal with the onset of the hot monsoon season, the National News Agency, RSS reported on Friday.

According to the RSS, four out of the 18 encephalitis patients who were admitted at the Bheri Zonal Hospital have died due to the disease so far while eight have returned home after treatment. As many as six encephalitis patients are undergoing treatment, according to Arjun Gautam, medical recorder at the hospital.

In Siraha, eastern terai district, two flood victims were killed by diarrhea. The deceased were KuthaniDevi Sadai, 60, and four year old girl of Badharamal VDC-9. Contamination in the water due to the flood caused diarrhea epidemic there affecting more than 24 families.

Flood affected Lothpurwa area of Rupandehi district is also tremendously affected by diarrhea, typhoid and fever. Three hundred children of 45 families are plagued by the diseases. Health post incharge Tirtha Raj Aryal said health post largely lacks medicines.

ECHO provides € 9.5 million to South Asia's flood victims

The European Commission has allocated €9.5 million in humanitarian aid to help flood victims in Bangladesh, India and Nepal.

According to the press release by the European Commission's Humanitarian Aid department, ECHO, the assistance are aimed at distribution of food rations and the provision of drinking water, emergency shelter and healthcare, in particular to prevent outbreaks of water-borne diseases.

"The next step is to assist the recovery of livelihoods, damaged housing and water-sanitation facilities. The emergency funds are channelled through ECHO under the responsibility of Louis Michel, the European Commissioner for Development and Humanitarian Aid," the release adds.

Commissioner Michel said: "Many Europeans have experienced flooding in recent years and we know how important it is to get rapid assistance in such a terrible situation. Our thoughts are with those who have lost homes, livestock and livelihoods or, even worse, relatives or friends – but not just our thoughts: The European Commission has taken strenuous action to provide humanitarian assistance to the victims. We have immediately dispatched our emergency experts to assess the most urgent basic needs and to liaise with other international relief agencies. On the basis of their assessment, we have decided to allocate €9.5 million in emergency aid."

By early August, over five million households were affected by the floods in India and over one million families in Bangladesh. In Nepal, over 350,000 people have been displaced from their homes. In the three countries damage includes loss of standing crops, serious erosion of farmland and property, destruction of livestock, foods and tools, as well as the contamination of surface water supplies, wells and latrines.

Five hundred displaced family in water scarce

A month ago they were awashed by monsoon flood and forced to displace, but now they are struggling for a single drop. Five hundred displaced family of kailali, a farwest district of Nepal, have such a saga.

The flood victims of Bhajani, Thapapur and Lalbojhi VDC of Kailali are staying in a makeshift shelter at Mahunyal Community Forest of Bhajani VDC since a month. They are being deprived of drinking water since the villagers are denying to share limited water source. The availability of water for washing and bathing are far beyond the reach.

The victims have knocked the door of Village Development Committee, a local governing body of village, to install water pumps, but of no avail. VDC secretary replied it is against the law to install water pumps in temporary shelter. They have even tried to install water pumps with their own sources, raising Rs. 25 per

which will definitely provide solace to the sufferers. But the utilization of those funds are questionable again. There is not proper mechanism that can ensure the right usage of the money. To curb on the situation, in some districts Chief District Officer have issued mandatory order for aspiring groups to inform about raised funds and its deliverance.

Unmanaged and random distribution of relief material is one of the major problem. As we have published report on 15th August, relief packages are still elusive for victims of Dhanusha and Mahottari. The victims of Banke and Sunsari had previously protested charging officials and political leaders on being partial while distributing relief materials.

The related sector actors should reckon on these circumstances and should initiate to redress it.

In our opinion, distribution should not utterly hinge upon the fund raiser discretion rather it should be delivered according to the needs. It will be far better than now if assistance to the disaster victims would be delivered through one door policy. It can promote proportionate distribution and avoid satiation and devoid.

Stress on greater Interaction to end blame game

India wants the inundation and flood problems in the Tarai to be sorted out together with Nepal in a pragmatic manner to ensure a "win-win" situation for both the countries.

Javed Asraf, Counsellor (Commercial) at the Indian Embassy said: "We (Nepal and India) need to look for ways to work together, not raise problems." Asraf was talking to journalists on Wednesday about the problem of inundation faced by people of both the sides at an interaction at the Indian Embassy.

Whenever there are floods, the blame game starts, he said. "While people in the states of Bihar and Uttar Pradesh (UP) accuse Nepal, it is vice-versa here. India is blamed for floods in Nepal," he said.

Referring to issues related to the Rasiawal Khurd Lautan dam and the Laxmanpur barrage, he said the issue of floods and inundation should "not be politicised." He suggested that the Nepal government hold a "greater interaction" with the Bihar and UP governments to address the problem in an "integrated approach."

As part of efforts to resolve the problem, Asraf said India is ready to invest some NRS 2 arab (2 billion) to build an embankment in the Kamala river. However, India is yet to get a nod from the Nepali side, he said.

Nepalis in UAE and Qatar donate for flood victims

The Nepali Diaspora in United Arab Emirates (UAE) and Qatar has made donations to help the flood victims of Nepal. The Nepalis in Qatar contributed over Rs 640,000 while those in UAE donated over 14,000 in local currency.

According to a statement by Nepali embassies in UAE and Doha, the fund collected from various organisations and individuals in that country has been transferred to the Prime Minister's Emergency Funds.

The Nepali embassy in Qatar had run donation collection campaign for a week during which 39 organisations and 31 individuals donated for this noble cause. A circular was also made in the UAE for donations.

The donors in UAE include Nepalis in Ghantut (632), Nepal Women Society (501), Emirates Newa Pucha (1437) NRNA and Nepali Professional Organisation (9425) and Nepali Samaaj (2377).

Two hundred family are at risk

Two hundred houses at Pasgaun VDC of Lamjung district have been at extreme risk of landslide. A whole Sidthee village is cracked into two portion due to the landslide occurred on Saturday. Feared of possible incident, 15 families have already been displaced.

Seven thousand residents of Kusma, district headquarter of Parwat, are suffering from water scarcity as the pipe line of main supply center was swept away by the landslide. (25th Aug)

Expired medicines distributed to flood victims

Medicines crossing expiry date have been distributed at the health camp intend for flood victims in Dhanusha. According to the largest daily newspaper of Nepal, Kantipur, such happened on Saturday during the free health camp at Raghunathpur of Dhanusha district. Dhanusha is one of the worst flood-hit district of eastern terai.

According to the report, health camp was jointly organized by District Public Health Office, Zonal Hospital and Doctor Association. District Public Health Office and Zonal Hospital are fully state run body.

Locals blamed "Idicom plus kid", a children ailment, was distributed inspite having crossed last date of consumption. Some other distributed medicines too were at the end of expiry, merely one week to a month.. During the health camp, medicines were freely distributed. District Public Health Officer Bizaya Kumar Jha, however, refuted the allegation and claimed that those medicines were not distributed.

Flood damaged crops worth 30 million

The Bardiya District Agriculture Office (BDAO) on Tuesday said that floods that ravaged the district in July damaged crops worth Rs 3 crore (30 million), eroded hundreds of bighas of land and damaged roads.

The floods damaged crops, including paddy and maize, worth Rs 1,66,12000 planted in 5,777 hectares of land. It also damaged vegetables worth Rs 1,50,00000 planted in 15,000 hectares of land. "We have only taken into account the cost of labour, seeds and fertilizers. The figures will definitely go up if the cost of the produce is also included," district agriculture publicity officer Shiva Raj Subedi said.

The floods damaged crops planted in 60,000 hectares of land in 31 VDCs and the Gulariya municipality, the BDAO said. "The floods every year have not only eroded land of the farmers, but also covered fertile land with sand," a social worker Govinda Pandey said. Floods in the Karnali and Babai rivers eroded hundreds of hectares of land and damaged roads.

"The farmers lost around Rs 1 crore due to the erosion caused by the floods," technician at the BDAO, Bhanu Bhakta Bhattarai, said. The movement of the people has been affected as the floods damaged the Hulaki road in the district.

"The Babai and Karnali rivers need to be controlled to prevent floods," district president of the Nepali Congress Sanjaya Gautam said. "The government has made no efforts in this regard though a delegation from the district has been visiting Kathmandu every year to draw the government's attention to the problem," he said.

32 districts of Nepal, out of 75, are affected by flood and inundation, according to the Home Ministry.

The lawmakers of Banke and Bardia, worst flood hit districts, asked the government to think about the impact of dams and barrages constructed by India along the border.

Staffers and the management of Spice Nepal Private Ltd, provider of Mero Mobile, have dispatched relief materials worth NRs. 426000 for flood victims.

Rainfall and flood destroyed seventy five percent of vegetable crops in Rupandehi.

Strikes and political violence in southern Nepal have been hampering efforts by aid workers to distribute aid to flood victims, said officials from the Nepal Red Cross Society (NRCS).

Over 583,000 flood victims in the country's densely populated Terai region continue to be affected by food shortages and face accommodation problems, according to the NRCS, the country's most active relief organisation.

"The current political situation has greatly restricted our movements and affected the work of our rescuers," Sanjeev Kafle, director of an NRCS disaster unit, told IRIN.

Over the past few months, Madhesi activists have been demonstrating for greater political rights and regional autonomy in the Terai region. Local human rights activists, however, said they feared the violence had got worse and that aid workers felt threatened.

Dozens of local and international aid agencies have been providing assistance, but they have had difficulty accessing vehicles for rescuing people and sending in supplies because of strikes by Madhesi protesters, led by Janatantrik Terai Mukti Morcha (JTMM), aid agencies said.

UN and non-governmental organisations have been appealing to the JTMM to allow unhindered access to flood victims, but despite its leaders' positive response, fears among aid workers, especially those who happen to be from the rival ethnic Pahade (hill people) community, persist.

The problem is most acute in the flood-affected districts of Sarlahi, Mohattari, Dhanusa and Saptari where the JTMM has been organising strikes over the past six days, the NRCS said.

Floods and landslides have affected nearly 50 of Nepal's 75 districts, killing around 146 people and displacing 22,000 families. Over 46,000 houses have been damaged and more than 130,000 hectares of arable land have been ruined, according to the NRCS.

In the past couple of days over 16 people have also died in landslides in Gulmi, Pyuthan and Rukum districts in the northwest of the country. *IRIN*

Cash, relief materials worth millions handed over

Representative from four organisations handed over relief materials worth around Rs 15 million to Prime Minister Girija Prasad Koirala. Representatives from Kantipur Publications Pvt Ltd, Image Channel Pvt Ltd, Nepal Telecom and Nepal Electricity Authority met Prime Minister Girija Prasad Koirala at his official residence at Baluwatar on Monday and handed over the cash to be deposited in the PM's Natural Disaster Relief Fund and the relief materials.

The Federation of Nepalese Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FNCCI) said it has collected cash and relief materials worth Rs 32 lakh for the flood victims. The FNCCI aims to collect cash and materials worth Rs 5 million in total, the FNCCI told a press meet here. The FNCCI handed over the cash and relief materials to the district coordination committee that has representatives of the FNCCI's district chapters as members.

The FNCCI has divided the flood-hit districts into five categories and the relief

Addressing the press conference, Chandiraj Dhakal, the FNCCI president, said the relief materials would reach the flood victims very soon. The top three cash donors in the list of the FNCCI are its staffers (Rs 350,000), Chandi Raj Dhakal (Rs 50,000) and industrialist Padma Jyoti (Rs 51,000).

Pyuthan victims yet to get relief

Landslide-affected people of Arkha VDC in Pyuthan district, where seven persons died in a landslip on Friday, are yet to get any relief despite repeated appeals. Due to the landslide, the ground in six VDCs has split leaving gaping cracks. Due to the landslide it is taking people at least four hours to move from one VDC to another.

On landslide massacre, Sumitra Giri, her five-year-old son Momeb, her 12-year-old daughter Rukmini, 32-year-old brother-in-law Belbahadur Giri, 38-year-old Shivprasad BK, 74-year-old Khadku Thapa and another unidentified person died in the landslide. Nine houses were damaged while 27 others are facing the risk of damage. All 164 persons from these 27 houses have shifted to a safer place. The landslide swept away standing crops of rice, maize, millet and 37 heads of buffaloes.

Assistant chief district officer Khem Bahadur Thapa, chief of the district police office Shyam Gyawali, district representatives of Red Cross and Tikuri Sakriya Yuva Samuh conducted an inspection of the disaster site. Assistant CDO Thapa said the landslide had caused damage to the tune of crores of rupees. The landslide also damaged the 18 KW mini-hydel project at Ghattekhol, a suspension bridge and drinking water pipes.

Pyuthan Red Cross minister Govind Rijal confessed that his organisation did not have the immediate wherewithal to provide assistance to the landslide affected people. Pyuthan CDO Tej Prasad Poudel said the administration would rush the first phase of assistance by Monday to the affected area. Fears of an epidemic breaking out in the affected area are looming large. Arkha VDC is the only one in the district that does not have telecom facilities.

S. Asia Flood Victims Forced to Consume Raw Food

Victims of South Asia's ruinous monsoon floods were eating raw wheat flour to survive in Bihar and other Eastern states in India, as Christian NGOs sought more generous gifts for the victims.

"Villages in Bihar were eating wheat flour mixed with water due to not being able to cook and the inadequacy of government relief efforts," reported an official. Roads were also blocked and relief camps were looted by angry villagers who demanded more food.

More than 2,000 people have died from snake bites, drowning, diarrhea and house collapses since heaviest monsoon rain said to hit

South Asia in over three decades devastated much of northern India and Bangladesh beginning in July. More than 30 million, meanwhile, have been displaced by massive flooding in India, Bangladesh, Pakistan, and Nepal.

"We are sleeping and eating inside the trucks as there is water everywhere and we have nowhere to go," said Anukul Samanta, a villager in West Midnapore district. Even drinking water has been difficult, he complained.

Christian volunteers and aid agencies that have been serving the flood victims for the past several weeks, have meanwhile been on high alert and are hoping to bolster their relief efforts with financial support from the international community.

According to the latest reports, Catholic Relief Services (CRS) staff and partners in India are responding to an increase in water-borne illnesses in the Indian state of Bihar on the Nepalese border, an area struggling to recover from the worst monsoon flooding in decades.

Nurses in remote health centers are treating more cases of malaria, diarrhea and respiratory infections. Snake bites are also on the rise, and health workers will need larger supplies of anti-venom to prevent victims from dying, reported CRS, the official international humanitarian agency of the Catholic community in the United States.

"There are still so many families who are totally helpless, living on the streets or under trees or in other people's houses," said Denis Baskey, regional director of Caritas Rajshahi in Bangladesh, in a report last Thursday. "They need food, water, medicines. It is quite desperate."

Caritas Internationalis – the confederation of 162 Catholic relief, development, and social service organizations present in

Landslide Massacre

Seven killed in Pyuthan

Seven persons died and one person was injured in a landslide in Arkha VDC in northern Pyuthan district Friday night. Those dead in the landslide triggered by incessant rains included four members of a family. Six persons were killed in Gulmi and three in Rukum on the same day.

The landslide occurred in Payunpata ward 5 of Purda Arkha VDC. Pregnant Sumitra Giri, her five-year-old son, Rohini Giri and Bel Bahadur Giri, all of the same family, perished in the landslide. Their house was also demolished in the disaster. Three others Chatak BK of the same village and two other unidentified persons also died in the landslide, which occurred while they were collecting firewood.

A local, Prem Thapa, said five of the seven died on the spot while two, who were being taken to a hospital, died near the border of Pyuthan and Gulmi districts. Bhimi Thapa, who was hurt in the landslide, is being treated at the Pyuthan hospital. Arkha VDC lies 14 km from Khalanga, the headquarters of Pyuthan.

According to Thapa, some locals had taken shelter in a cowshed belonging to Bir Bahadur Thapa after landslides started there Thursday night. The whole Arkha VDC has been affected as smaller landslides are frequent because of incessant rain. Police and Red Cross Society volunteers have reached the village for rescue with relief materials.

Inundation in vegetable farms tripled the price

Prices of vegetable have skyrocketed in the region due to inundation of the major vegetable farms in the tarai region triggered by incessant rain in the last couple of weeks. The markets in the region have witnessed a crunch in fresh vegetables mainly due to decline in supply, traders said.

According to Makawanpur Vegetable and Fruit Traders Association (MVFTA), the prices of tomato, bitter melon, cabbage, cauliflower, Christophine (skush), potato and green chilly have gone up three folds over the last two weeks.

The price of bitter melon shot up from Rs 15 to Rs 45 per kg in two weeks. Potato was eight rupees more expensive today, rising to Rs 24 per Kg over the period, said traders. Bhola Thing, a trader, said that the prices of other vegetable items like brinjal, pointed gourd, cowpea and spinach, have also risen significantly.

"Vegetables from the hilly areas of the district are coming to the Hetauda market from last week, but the amount is far less than the demand as the supply from tarai has gone down significantly due to the floods and inundation of vegetable farms," said Keshav Dahal, vice-president of MVFTA.

According to Dahal, vegetable supplies in Hetauda have dwindled to 15 tons from 45 tons in normal times. Traders have warned that the prices would further rise in the days ahead if the supply situation did not improve.

Similarly, the prices of vegetables have ballooned sharply in Dailekh, a hilly district in Mid-western Nepal, over the last three weeks following a landslide that blocked vehicular movement along the 40 kilometer-long Dailekh-Surkhet highway.

The supply of vegetable from Nepalgunj, Surkhet and Ratanagla, which are the major sources of vegetables for Dailekh, have come to a grinding halt due to the disruption in transportation. The prices of tomato, potato, dry onion and cabbage have inched up by two to three folds over the period in Dailekh.

According to the traders, tomato, potato and cabbage are priced at Rs 60, Rs 32 and Rs 30 per kg respectively at the present, up from Rs 30, Rs 18 and Rs 8 respectively three weeks ago. (*The Kathmandu Post*)

Landslide killed nine in western Nepal

A landslide in Neta VDC of Gulmi district killed six persons, including four members of a family, at 4 am Friday. The landslide killed four family members of a local Sob Bahadur BK and two of his neighbours. Four members of Sop Bahadur's family Tika Kumari (mother), 75; Amrita (wife), 35; Krishna, 11 and Suraj, 4 (sons) and two neighbours Jamuna BK, 27 and her six-year-old daughter Muna were killed on the spot.

Sob Bahadur had recently left for India where he works. Till a month ago the locality had altogether 14 dalit households. Twelve of these had been displaced following a landslide in neighboring Jaljala VDC of Baglung district. Only two households had stayed behind.

It is believed that Jumana, who was pregnant, had gone to her neighbor's, along with her daughter, after she felt labor pains. That was when the landslide struck the house. Jamuna's spouse is also in India for work.

Similarly, three persons of a single family were killed in a landslide at Duli VDC-3 in Rukum district, Friday morning. Mani Khatri, 28, and his sons Bhopal, 8, and Lok Bahadur, 5, were killed by the landslide. Their house was buried by landslide at around 3 am.

Slow relief response in eastern Terai

Though highly affected, the distribution of relief materials in central and eastern Terai districts have been slower than in other flood-hit districts. Saptari, Dhanusa, Mahottari, Siraha are among those districts.

Security, transportation and communication problems have hindered the easy flow of relief in the central and eastern Terai, said Indra Prasad Adhikari, director

of communication department of Nepal Red Cross Society. Politically, the eastern and central Tarai are in crisis. Unrepaired roads and lack of adequate communication facilities have complicated the situation, he said with The Himalayan Times Daily.

However, the western Tarai has received adequate relief. People are receiving relief from different organisations for resettlement, said Adhikari. The NRCS said it has received Rs 4.7 million from the government, organisations and people. It has distributed food items to 151,200 people and non-food items to 9,762 families. Over 1,000 Red Cross volunteers are engaged in the distribution of relief.

Baglung faces food shortage

Food shortage has affected the remote VDCs of Baglung district including Rajkut, Devisthan, Darling and Nisi from the past two months. The VDCs lie some 108 km west of the district headquarters Baglung bazaar. The natural disasters caused lack of food grains in the VDCs.

"Stock of food grain in my home finished and I have no money to buy more," Tejendra Bikram Kunwar of Rajkut said. He said that the local administration and the Nepal Food Corporation have to take initiatives to provide relief at the earliest. "We have been facing food shortage for the past two months," Jeetendra Kather of Nisi said. Recent storm damaged maize plantation at Rajkut and Devisthan VDCs, locals said.

"The administration has already directed the NFC depots at Birtibang and Harichaur to distribute food grains," CDO Surya Prasad Bhandari said, adding that they are already discussing the matter with the NFC regional office in Pokhara.
